

Supreme Knight's Message by Carl A. Anderson

A HISTORIC MILESTONE

AS WE CELEBRATE THE PLACEMENT OF 1,000 ULTRASOUND MACHINES, OUR WORK TO BUILD A CULTURE OF LIFE CONTINUES



THIS MONTH in Columbia, we celebrate a remarkable milestone in the history of the Knights of Columbus: the placement of the 1,000th ultrasound machine in a pro-life pregnancy center. We began this initiative with the placement of two ultrasound machines in Iowa and Florida in 2009.

This program is saving hundreds of thousands of lives and I am sure that one day soon, because of the efforts of thousands of brother Knights and countless pro-life volunteers we will save the lives of 1 million unborn children — the greatest humanitarian achievement in the history of the Knights of Columbus.

Although our program formally began in 2009, its genesis was really decades earlier in a conversation with Dr. Jérôme Lejeune one afternoon in my home. I had arranged for Dr. Lejeune to come to Washington, D.C., to testify before Congress on the humanity of the unborn child.

He was the world-famous geneticist who had discovered that the most common form of Down syndrome, also known as trisomy 21, resulted from a condition in which a person has 47 chromosomes in each cell rather than 46. After this discovery, Dr. Lejeune spent the rest of his life working to make the lives of those with Down syndrome better.

This is what he told Congress: "At two months of age, the human being is less than one thumb's length from the head to the rump. He would fit neatly into a nutshell, but everything is there — hands, feet, head, organs, brain — all are in place. If you look very closely, you would see the palm creases, and if you were a fortune- teller, you could read the good adventure of that person. Looking still closer with a microscope, you could detect the fingerprints — every document is available to give him his national identity card!

"With the extreme sophistication of technology we have invaded his privacy. ... We now know what he feels, we have listened to what he hears, smelled what he tastes and we have really seen him dancing full of grace and youth. Science has turned the fairy-tale of Tom Thumb into a true story.

"The incredible Tom Thumb really does exist. Not the one of the fairy tale, but the one each of us has been. For it is from this true story that the fairy tales were invented. If Tom Thumb's adventures have always enchanted children, if they can still evoke emotion in grownups, it is because all the children of the world, all the grown-ups they have turned into, were one day a Tom Thumb in their mother's womb."

As an advisor to Pope John Paul II, Dr. Lejeune proposed the establishment of a new Vatican entity—the Pontifical Academy for Life. We discussed possible initiatives for the future academy, and he confided that the pope had asked him to serve as its first president. But Dr. Lejeune would die of cancer in 1994, the same year that it was established. Later, I had the honor of being appointed a member of the academy by Pope John Paul II and re-appointed by Pope Francis in 2017.

Dr. Lejeune and I had also discussed ways in which we could help those considering abortion to better perceive this reality.

Decades later, when advances in 3D ultrasound technology made this truly possible, the Knights of Columbus Ultrasound Initiative was a natural response — and the response of so many brother Knights since then has been truly inspiring.

Building a culture of life requires all of us to strive for the just treatment of innocent unborn children and to accompany with compassionate concern women facing crisis pregnancies.

This month, we celebrate a historic milestone, but there are still many more milestones ahead of us in the lives of thousands of vulnerable unborn children. Our Ultrasound Initiative must continue to expand into every community where it is needed.

Sometimes, those of us in the pro-life movement may feel like the poet who stopped by woods on "the darkest evening of the year." But like that poet, we too should resolve that although "the woods are lovely, dark and deep" we have promises to keep and miles to go before we sleep. Many lives depend upon our continued determination.

THE LIGHT SHINES IN THE DARKNESS

IN A WORLD OFTEN OVERSHADOWED BY SIN, THE PRESENCE OF CHRIST REMAINS OUR TRUE HOPE AND GUIDING LIGHT

WE HAVE TURNED the corner. The shortest, darkest days of the year are slowly growing longer and lighter. Yet, in the cold of a winter's night, it may be hard to envision

the warmth and light of spring.

It was amid darkness that the Savior was born. At first, the darkness of the crude stable where the incarnate Son of God entered the world was punctuated only by the flickering lights of candles and torches. Yet Jesus was born not merely in the dark of night but also amid the dark night of humanity's sinful state. Despite God's signs and messages spoken through prophets and kings, darkness seemed to reign over the good earth God had made.

Was there any hope that the flickering lights in a rough Bethlehem stable could even be seen in the darkness, let alone overcome it? Was there any chance that the Child in the manger, born into the poorest of circumstances, was in fact "the light of the world" (Jn 8:12)? As the story of Jesus' birth unfolded, the night sky was brightly lit not only with stars but also with angels reflecting the beauty and brightness of the One who is "God from God and light from light." And over this stable hovered a star, brighter than the rest, the star of the Epiphany, by which the greatness of the little Child was first revealed to the nations.

"The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it" (Jn 1:5).

As the year 2019 dawns upon us, we may feel that darkness still reigns over the world. Looking about, we see under cover of darkness a brutal disregard in society for the sacredness of human life — especially the lives of unborn children, the frail elderly and the chronically ill. We see amid the darkness many people living at the point of a sword for the faith that they profess. We see the sorry plight of immigrants and refugees. We live in a culture perpetually outraged, increasingly polarized, tragically plagued by violence. We see the darkness of sin in our Church, with the appalling abuse of children by some of its own leaders. We look with gloom as many, especially the young, forsake the light of faith for the false promises of a godless secularity. We also sense the darkness of sin lurking in our hearts and homes. We find how easily we prefer this darkness to the light of grace.

Still, "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it."

Could it be that even in our times the flickering light in the Bethlehem stable might still shine forth? The light of the Epiphany star heralded a light that would never fade. The light of heaven itself shone forth as the Holy Spirit descended upon Jesus during his baptism in the Jordan. Jesus, "the light of the world," would manifest his Father's glory in the power of the Spirit as he preached the Good News, healed the sick, expelled demons and cured the sick. "I have come to set the earth on fire," Jesus said, "and how I wish it were blazing" (Lk 12:49).

Our Savior ignited this fire upon the Cross, in the glory of his Resurrection and in his commission to the Apostles to spread the Gospel. And he ignited it, too, in our hearts on the day we were baptized "with fire and the Holy Spirit" (Mt 3:11). We should frequently ask ourselves: Is it still burning brightly?

It does no good to bemoan the state of the world. Rather, the light of faith and zeal for the Gospel must burn in our hearts. Knights, like missionaries of old, are called to go and set the world on fire by charity, unity and fraternity.

Pope Francis Meets with K of C Leaders



Pope Francis received Supreme Knight Carl Anderson and Supreme Chaplain Archbishop William Lori of Baltimore in a private audience at the Vatican on Dec. 17. It was the fourth such audience granted by Pope Francis to the supreme knight.

During the course of the meeting, the supreme knight and Archbishop Lori spoke with the Holy Father about the many activities of the Knights of Columbus in 2015, particularly the Order's efforts to aid persecuted Christians in the Middle East.

Through the Knights of Columbus Christian Refugee Relief Fund, the Order has distributed more than \$5 million to support Christians in the Middle East. In addition to this financial support, the Knights of Columbus has organized a major public awareness campaign about the situation faced by Christians in the Middle East.



During the visit, the supreme knight also presented the Holy Father with a contribution of \$1.6 million from the Vicarius Christi Fund, offered on behalf of the 1.9 million members of the Knights of Columbus. The Vicarius Christi Fund has generated \$56,015,000 for the pope's personal charities and causes since its establishment in 1981.

Virtus Training (Diocesan, Church and School Requirement)

We continue to urge all brothers to complete their VIRTUS training, fingerprinting and background checks. New training sessions are available throughout the year. This training is mandated by the diocese, church, and school for everyone in contact with or participating in programs with youth, elderly, and special needs individuals. You may register for one of the scheduled VIRTUS training sessions by visiting the **VIRTUS.org** website, registering a login-id and password, and selecting a training session and location that fits your schedule.

Safe Environment Training (K of C Supreme Requirement)

The Safe Environment Program safeguards children and other vulnerable persons, assures members and their families that we maintain a safe environment, protects members from awkward situations, misunderstandings, and appearances of impropriety, builds trust with arch/dioceses and parishes, and protects the good name of the Knights of Columbus.

The training is mandated for: **Grand Knights, Program Directors, Community Directors, and Family Directors.** You can also help our council protect those at risk by registering for the training on a voluntary basis, even if not required by your position. 

Woodlawn is a 2015 American Christian sports drama film directed by The Erwin Brothers, Andrew and Jon Erwin. The film, which is based on the true story of Tandy Gerelds and Tony Nathan, stars Sean Astin, Nic Bishop, Caleb Castille, Sherri Shepherd, Jon Voight and C. Thomas Howell. It was produced by Kevin Downes and Daryl Lefever with Crescent City Pictures and Red Sky Studios and was released on October 16, 2015 by Pure Flix Entertainment. "Woodlawn" is the true story of how faith in God saved a city torn apart by racism.



When <u>Woodlawn High School</u> in <u>Birmingham</u>, <u>Alabama</u> is controversially desegregated in 1973, <u>Tony Nathan</u>, a gifted black high school football player, joins the school's predominantly white football team along with several other black players. The coach, Tandy Gerelds, tells the team to use their shared anger to unite them, but black and white players clash on and off the field. After a riot at the school, Gerelds consents to allowing traveling sports chaplain Hank Erwin to speak to the team as a "motivational speaker". Hank's speech moves nearly the entire team to accept Hank's invitation to commit their lives to Jesus Christ, and join together in prayer.


