CHAPLAIN'S REPORT

The K of C and Sacramental Accompaniment

In the 19th century, the young men of St. Mary's Parish in New Haven, Conn., were not actively engaged in the Catholic faith. So 29-year-old Father Michael J. McGivney gathered the "old guard" of active men — who were in their 30s and 40s — and invited them to take leadership roles in the K of C. Their primary evangelical goal: Help younger, non-practicing Catholic men engage in the faith.

This goal remains relevant even today. During the Easter season and throughout summer, your local K of C council can assist in evangelical outreach, especially through the Order's Sacramental Gifts program.

Start by discussing with your council your parish's sacramental programs. Let the Knights know how they can assist those just entering the Church at the Easter Vigil. Perhaps the council can become the place a new Catholic man first experiences fraternity and support. Coach the men of your council on the best way to welcome these new Catholics into the K of C. Remind the Knights that converts may already have a well-developed spirituality and theological understanding from years of seeking the truth.

In addition, the K of C's Sacramental Gifts program can help young men and fathers renew their own practice of the faith. A small gift — with the promise of prayers, support and perhaps the gift of a Mass said for the family's intention — will go a long way in showing dads that the K of C cares for the spiritual growth of all the men of the parish.

With your help, may every council understand its fundamental role in welcoming those returning to the faith and may the K of C continue to evangelize those on the peripheries.

Supreme Knight's Message by Carl A. Anderson

WE WILL REBUILD

THE TRAGIC FIRE AT NOTRE-DAME CATHEDRAL EVOKES BOTH OUR HISTORY AND OUR RESPONSIBILITY AS CATHOLICS



I AM WRITING this column while a massive fire is still engulfing our beautiful Notre-Dame Cathedral in Paris. I say "our" because this magnificent structure has been for centuries an artistic patrimony of humanity, a place of prayer for millions of Catholics in France and throughout the world — and, more recently, a special place for the Knights of Columbus.

In May 2017, I joined a delegation of brother Knights from Paris to attend Mass at Notre-Dame Cathedral and to participate in a special exposition and veneration of the relic of the Crown of Thorns. Later that year, the Knights of Columbus was one of the major sponsors of a light show on the cathedral's façade. Titled "Dame de Coeur" (Queen of Hearts), the light show depicted the history of the cathedral in commemoration of World War I.

From the two-volume history *The Knights of Columbus in Peace and*

War (1920), we read this: "In Paris on Good Friday 1919, the most impressive religious service held in the history of the American Expeditionary Forces in Europe took place when the Knights of Columbus ... held a service there for the public adoration of the cross. Ten thousand Americans packed the great edifice; the Cardinal Archbishop of Paris, Mons. Amette, presided."

Much has been said about the significance of this tragic fire. It is difficult to grasp its significance for the French people and especially French Catholics.

Perhaps "The Virgin at Noon," a poem by Paul Claudel, can help us understand. It is noteworthy that Claudel's conversion took place in Notre-Dame Cathedral during the singing of the Magnificat on Christmas Day 1886.

"It is noon. The church is open. I must go in. Mother of our Lord, I have not come to pray. I have nothing to give and nothing to ask. I am here, my Lady, only to look at you. To look at you, to cry for joy, to know That I am your son and you are there. Only for one moment when everything stops. Noon! To be with you, Mary, in this place where you are. To say nothing, to look at your face. To let my heart sing in its own language. To say nothing, but simply to sing because my heart is too full....

Supreme Knight's Message (cont'd)

Because you saved me, because you saved France. Because France too, like myself, was for you a thing to be considered. Because at that moment when everything collapsed, you intervened. Because you saved France once again. Because you saved France once again. Because it is noon, because we are at this moment of today. Because you are there for always, simply because you are Mary, Simply because you exist. Mother of Our Lord, we give thanks to you."

When the president of France announced today that Notre-Dame Cathedral will be rebuilt, I thought of how the great Gothic cathedrals were originally constructed. An account from 1144 states that the faithful were freely "harnessed to carts, laden with stones, timbers, corn and whatever might be needed for the work of building the cathedral, the towers of which rose like magic into the heavens.... Everywhere men humbled themselves, did penance, and forgave their enemies. Men and women could be seen dragging heavy loads through mire and marsh, praising in song the miracle which God was performing before their eyes."

Mindful of all the controversies consuming the Church in recent years, the image of this burning cathedral seemed in a way to symbolize the devastation so many Catholics have felt as our Church has been rocked by one crisis after another.

Fires have destroyed great cathedrals before, and they have been rebuilt. So let us hope this will be true again.

But not only this church. Let us resolve to patiently "rebuild" the Church, not with granite and mortar, but with living stones in the spirit of those earlier builders — with humility, penance and with gratitude for the miracle that God is still performing before our eyes.

And let us do so with confidence in Mary, who "at that moment when everything collapsed" does not hesitate to intervene for us.

Supreme Chaplain Archbishop William E. Lori MARY, MOTHER OF THE CHURCH

THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY, OUR MOTHER AND MODEL, INTERCEDES FOR AND CONSOLES THE CHURCH, THE BODY OF CHRIST



INVALUABLE TO the Christian life is a warm and loving devotion to Mary, the Mother of God. I was blessed to grow up in a home where the rosary was prayed daily, even on the busiest and most difficult days. There was always a statue of the Blessed Mother in our home and other reminders of Mary's love for us, her children. At school, May processions culminated in the crowning of a statue as we all sang to Our Lady.

In time, I got into the habit of praying a daily rosary, and as I meditated on the life of Jesus through the eyes of Mary, my vocation came into sharper focus. In my final years at Mount St. Mary's Seminary in Emmitsburg, Md., I often went to the beautiful grotto up the mountain, a national shrine dedicated to Our Lady of Lourdes. In the quiet of that grotto, my love for Mary deepened as I prepared to serve the Church as a priest.

But it was not until I visited Lourdes, France, for the first time in the 1980s, that I was overwhelmed with the healing power of the Blessed Mother's intercession. In that holy place, where Mary revealed herself to St. Bernadette as the Immaculate Conception, I experienced a wonderful healing, cleansing and renewal of body, mind and spirit. Over the years, I have returned to Lourdes many times, often with pilgrims, many of whom suffer from serious illnesses. I visit with them before they go into the baths and, when feasible, pray with them after they emerge. The purifying love and powerful intercession of Mary is palpable in those encounters.

My love for the Blessed Mother likewise intensified when I visited the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Mexico City for the first time in 1990 and looked upon her miraculous image. The experience filled me with joy and opened my eyes to Mary's role in the evangelization of the world.

Inspired by these experiences, Marian devotion has become an essential part of my life. Like every good Knight of Columbus, I carry a rosary in my pocket. My father's own K of C rosary also remains in the little chapel in my residence. When the house is quiet at night, I often slip into the chapel and pray with my dad's rosary. As I do so, I think about all the people I met during the day and the many people who asked me to pray for them. As the day comes to a close, nothing is more consoling than to spend a little time in conversation with Mary.

I also look upon a beautiful statue of the Blessed Mother that I received from Cardinal James Hickey, my mentor and friend, when I became a bishop many years ago. When I look upon that image, I never fail to pray for the cardinal, whose example and memory continue to influence my life so deeply.

During the month of May, we honor Mary in a special way, and on June 10, the Monday after Pentecost, we will celebrate her as the Mother of the Church. Her virginity symbolizes the truth and purity of the Church's teaching and the sacrifice that the Church daily offers. Her motherhood symbolizes the maternal care that the Church gives to us, her children, reborn by water and the Holy Spirit. This love reaches us through many channels, not the least of which are the Church's ministries of healing and charity. And when members of the Knights of Columbus live the principle of charity, we help extend the loving care of the Church to the poor and the vulnerable.

These days, though, it is the Church — sinful in her members — that needs healing. Sins against young people and the failure of Church leaders to respond continue to haunt and hobble the Body of Christ. Many practical steps still need to be taken to ensure that bishops and other leaders are held accountable for their actions. But those steps alone, important as they are, won't fully heal the Church's wounds. For that, we must turn our gaze toward Mary, asking her prayers that the Church might be purified, cleansed, healed and renewed.

Pope Francis' message

Courage and Filial Intimacy to Call God "Father"



Pope Francis concludes his series of catechesis on the "Our Father" prayer, saying it is the Holy Spirit who is the teacher and protagonist of true prayer.

Courage to call "Father"

The Pope noted that Christian prayer that is "born of the audacity to call God by the name of 'Father'", expresses a "**filial intimacy**" into which we are introduced by the grace of the Holy Spirit. He cited a few examples from the New Testament where the various expressions of Jesus' prayers recall the text of the "Our Father".

In Mark's Gospel, when Jesus prays, "**Abba, Father**, all things are possible to you. Take this cup away from me, but not what I will but what you will", we discover His filial trust in the Father amidst the darkness, fear and anguish of the night of Gethsemane, where He asks that the Father's will be fulfilled.

Not without brothers and sisters

Elsewhere, Jesus teaches his disciples to cultivate a spirit of prayer that is insistent, but especially that bears the memory of our brothers and sisters, especially when we have difficult relationships with them.

In this regard, Jesus says in Mark's Gospel, "When you stand to pray, **forgive anyone** against whom you have a grievance, so that your heavenly Father may in turn forgive you your transgressions." The Pope noted that in the writings of Saint Paul we do not find the text of the "Our Father", but His presence emerges in that stupendous synthesis where the invocation of the Christian is condensed into a single word: "Abba! Father!" (cf. Rom 8:15; Gal 4:6).

In Luke's Gospel, Jesus fulfils the request of the disciples and teaches them how to pray to the Father.

Holy Spirit - the true protagonist of prayer

Pope Francis noted that the New Testament as a whole indicates that the first protagonist of all Christian prayer is the Holy Spirit.

"We could never pray without the power of the Holy Spirit. It is He who prays in us and moves us to pray well."

The Spirit, the Pope explained, is both the teacher and protagonist of true prayer. It is He who breathes into the heart of each one of Jesus' disciples, enabling them to pray as children of God, which they truly are in Baptism.

"The Spirit makes us pray in the 'furrow' that Jesus dug for us," the Pope said, explaining that by grace Christian prayer attracts us to the dialogue of **love of the Most Holy Trinity**.

Core of every prayer –"my" intimacy

The Holy Father observed that sometimes Jesus uses expressions that are very far from the text of the "Our Father". For example, while dying on the cross He cried out, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" (Mt 27:46).

Certainly, the Pope said, the heavenly Father cannot abandon His Son. "Yet His love for us, sinners," the Pope said, "has brought Jesus to this point: to the point of experiencing the abandonment of God, His distance because He has taken upon Himself all our sins."

But even in His anguished cry, "My God, my God", the Pope noted, the "my" remains the "core of the relationship with the Father" and the "core of faith and prayer".

Pope Francis noted that with this nucleus, a Christian can pray in any situation. All the prayers of the Bible, especially the Psalms, and the prayers throughout millennia of history have this nucleus.

The Holy Father urged that we never cease to speak about our brothers and sisters in humanity to the Father, so that none of them, especially the poor, may remain without consolation and a portion of love.

But to pray genuinely, the Pope said, "we must make ourselves little, so that the Holy Spirit may come into us and guide us in prayer."

Virtus Training (Diocesan, Church and School Requirement)
