

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT

The Coherence of Love and Sacrifice



"The priesthood is the love of the heart of Jesus," St. Jean Marie Vianney said.

Many of our brother Knights have had the privilege of serving as members of an honor guard, ushering, venerating and praying as the incorrupt heart relic of St. Jean Vianney made its way across the U.S. this year. Thousands of priests, seminarians, consecrated religious and lay faithful prayerfully encountered the saint's heart and sought renewal in their own lives. As one pastor of a church dedicated to St. Jean Vianney told his parishioners in the presence of the relic, "May my priesthood be forever changed from this day forward."

The national tour was held in conjunction of the 200th anniversary of the saint's arrival in Ars, France. The little town once emanated with a secular mentality

and utter indifference to God — so godless that no priest was willing to be assigned there. It is striking that this town forged over the course of 41 years of tireless and dedicated service to the Gospel the patron saint of priests.

One hundred years after Vianney died, St. John XXIII reminded priests of the coherence between love and sacrifice, a coherence that is necessary to produce faithful fruits. "Almost everyone knows his answer to the priest who complained to him that his apostolic zeal was bearing no fruit: 'You have offered humble prayers to God, you have wept, you have groaned, you have sighed. Have you added fasts, vigils, sleeping on the floor, castigation of your body? Until you have done all of these, do not think that you have tried everything'" (*Sacerdotii Nostri Primordia*, 72).

As the Church recalls the Sacred Heart of Jesus and the Immaculate Heart of Mary, let us encourage our brother Knights and their families to seek that deep unity and coherence of the love and sacrifice that the holy heart of St. Jean Vianney inspires. May the summer rest bring about a renewal in our own dedication to serve and show forth the love of God the Father especially amidst every indifference and trial ahead.

Supreme Knight's Message by Carl A. Anderson

FURTHER STEPS MUST BE TAKEN TO END THE PERSECUTION OF CHRISTIANS IN MANY PLACES THROUGHOUT THE WORLD



"TELL THEM I am dying because I am a Christian," said Blessed Isidore Bakanja shortly before he was killed in 1909 in the Belgian Congo. Isidore was baptized as a young man. He frequently prayed the rosary and proudly wore a scapular. The overseers of the plantation where Isidore worked demanded that he renounce his baptism, fearing that if their native workers became "brothers" in Christ, the brutally harsh conditions of plantation life would have to change. When Isidore refused, he was beaten to death.

I had the privilege of attending the beatification of Isidore Bakanja at the Vatican in 1994, and I will always remember the emotion with which St. John Paul II spoke of him.

I thought of Blessed Isidore's life and death as I read news accounts of a new report on the global persecution of Christians. The report, prepared for the British Government's Foreign Office, concluded that the persecution of Christians in parts of the world is at "near genocide levels."

British Foreign Secretary Jeremy Hunt believes that "political correctness" is partly responsible for the failure to confront the crisis. "There is a misplaced worry that it is somehow colonialist," he said, "to talk about a religion that was associated with colonial powers."

"What we have forgotten," he continued, is that "the Christians that are being persecuted are some of the poorest people on the planet."

A better understanding of the legal, economic and political status of Christians throughout the world is needed. Too often, desperate poverty and marginalization are compounded by political powerlessness and centuries-old traditions of discrimination in both law and practice.

Such circumstances make many Christians throughout the Middle East easy targets for extremists and victims easily ignored.

That is why during my trip to Iraq in March I met with the prime minister of the Kurdistan Regional Authority and on my return spoke with Vice President Mike Pence. Those conversations were encouraging, but much work remains.

My visit to Iraq was an opportunity to see firsthand the situation of the displaced Christians there, how their communities are struggling to survive and what the path to a sustainable future could look like.

In an excellent analysis of the current situation in Iraq, *America* magazine (April 19) recently asked the most fundamental question: "Can Christianity in northern Iraq survive after ISIS?"

The answer, of course, is that it is still too early to tell. But if Christianity does not survive there, it will not be because Iraqi Christians over the last century did not sacrifice their lives to maintain a Christian presence. And many who remain have sacrificed everything but their lives.

If Christianity does not survive in Iraq — and elsewhere in the region — it may well be a result of the silence and neglect by their brothers and sisters in the West.

These suffering Christians deserve our continued solidarity.

As noted in the *America* article, Archbishop Bashar Warda of Erbil has begun a number of development initiatives (many with our financial assistance) that could mean Christians will not "merely survive," but will actually "thrive" in Iraq.

There is a roadmap for sustainability of the Christian community, but it requires continued material and financial support.

And not just in the Middle East.

As the recent church bombings in Sri Lanka tragically demonstrate, too many Christians throughout the world echo Isidore Bakanja's words: "I am dying because I am a Christian."

These atrocities must end.

The genocide of Christians must never again be allowed, and the Christian communities in places like Iraq must be helped to survive.

WE MUST RESPOND TO CHALLENGES AS CATHOLICS BY MAKING A COMMITMENT TO CHRIST AND THE MISSION OF EVANGELIZATION



SUPPOSE IT'S TIME to change the oil in your car. The owner's manual specifies that the engine requires five quarts of oil, but you put in only two and a half. Some days later, the engine light comes on and your car stalls in traffic. Listening to a chorus of angry horns and epithets, you think to yourself: "Maybe I should have put in the full five quarts."

Half measures. We're tempted to use them all the time. You probably have your own examples of halfhearted efforts that made things worse instead of better.

We also can be prone to half measures when it comes to our Catholic faith. In many parts of the world, including the United States, Mass attendance is down. Our absent Catholics aren't merely out of town; many are gone. For a variety of distressing reasons, they are disconnected from the Lord, the Church, the

Mass and the sacraments. Studies reveal the sad fact that there are now more disaffiliated former Catholics than those who are practicing.

We talk a lot about evangelization, but things continue to get worse. So what's the answer?

St. Paul VI reminded us that evangelization is not merely one of the things the Church does; the mission to spread the Gospel constitutes the very heart of the Church's identity. The Church exists to proclaim, spread and celebrate the Good News by word, sacrament and charity. Woe to us if we do not preach the Gospel! (cf. 1 Cor 9:16).

The Gospel, after all, is not merely words. It is the incarnate savior who, in his boundless mercy, has forgiven our sins and unlocked the gates of heaven.

The answer, then, is not to stop talking about evangelization. Rather, the problem is how we go about this work. Not unlike the disciples prior to the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, we hesitate to "cry out full-throated and unsparingly" (Isaiah 58:1) in bearing witness to Jesus. We are likewise prone to half measures in repenting and believing in his Gospel; in instilling the teaching of Christ in ourselves and our families; and in living the Gospel both in our personal lives and in the wider society.

When the sound of the trumpet is faint, it's no wonder so few hear it.

Take, for example, a parish that is stagnant and shrinking. Its leadership might be tempted to address the problem with half measures, tweaking what's usually done by adding more friendly greeters at the door of the church or additional opportunities for socializing after Sunday Mass. Nothing is wrong with these things; in fact, they are very important. But lacking genuine missionary conversion, moved by the Holy Spirit, a parish will not experience renewal.

Genuine missionary conversion includes an urgent summons to prayer and repentance, first and foremost exemplified by the parish clergy and leadership. It also requires concentrated attention on good preaching and reverent liturgy; abundant opportunities for eucharistic adoration and confession; personal outreach to absent parishioners; sound catechesis for parishioners of all ages, especially the young; support of married couples and families; loving assistance to the sick and the dying; generous outreach to the poor and vulnerable; and more.

What about growth in the Knights of Columbus? Here, too, half measures will not do. For example, a business-as-usual membership drive may not bring the desired results. But when a council prayerfully commits itself to implementing the Faith in Action model, it can truly make an impact. When Knights are seen as growing in their relationship with Christ and in their life of prayer, banding together to serve actively the needs of the wider community, living the vocation of marriage and family joyfully and generously, and protecting vulnerable human life lovingly — others will want to join.

People are hungry. They are searching. They are looking for the real deal. Let's be done with half measures, especially in this season when we celebrate the full outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon his Church.

Pope Francis' message

Pope at Audience: the fire of God's love, the power of His word

Pope Francis reflects on the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles gathered with Mary in the Upper Room, and says the same Spirit continues to dwell in us.



At this week's General Audience held in a sun-drenched St Peter's Square, Pope Francis continued his catechesis on the Acts of the Apostles, focussing specifically on the day of Pentecost.

Prayer and breath

The Pope described the Apostles, gathered around Mary in the Upper Room, as being "in prayer". Prayer is the "lung", said the Pope, "that gives breath to disciples of all times; without prayer one cannot be a disciple of Jesus". The descent of the Holy

Spirit, he said, was "an event that exceeded their expectations": they were "surprised" by the "force of a wind that reminds us of the...primordial breath".

Wind and fire

To the wind is then added the fire, continued Pope Francis. The fire reminds of us the burning bush because, in the biblical tradition, "fire accompanies the manifestation of God". In the fire God delivers his living word, said the Pope, and the fire itself expresses God's work of "warming, illuminating and testing hearts". On Mount Sinai, we hear the voice of God. In Jerusalem, on the feast of Pentecost, it is the voice of Peter. Despite his own weakness, once filled with the fire of the Spirit, Peter's words acquire strength, "capable of piercing hearts... For God chooses what is weak in the world to confuse the strong", said Pope Francis.

Truth and love

"The Church is born of the fire of love", continued the Pope, a fire that "breaks out at Pentecost and manifests the power of the Word of the Risen One imbued with the Holy Spirit". The words of the Apostles themselves become imbued with the same Spirit. They become "a new, different word, which can be understood, as if it were translated simultaneously into all languages". This is the language of "truth and love, which is the universal language: even the illiterate can understand it".

Communion and reconciliation

Pope Francis went on to describe the Holy Spirit as "the creator of communion, the artist of reconciliation who knows how to remove barriers between Jews and Greeks, slaves and freedmen". The Holy Spirit "makes the Church grow by helping it to go beyond human limitations, sins and scandals", said the Pope. "Only the Spirit of God has the power to humanize" and to create connections, "beginning with those who receive Him".

Virtus Training (Diocesan, Church and School Requirement)

We continue to urge all brothers to complete their VIRTUS training, fingerprinting and background checks. New training sessions are available throughout the year. This training is mandated by the diocese, church, and school for everyone in contact with or participating in programs with youth, elderly, and special needs individuals. You may register for one of the scheduled **VIRTUS** training sessions by visiting the **VIRTUS.org** website, registering a login-id and password, and selecting a training session and location that fits your schedule.

There is a new form that must be used to complete your fingerprinting and background check. Before scheduling your appointment, please see your DGK/PD for the proper form.

Safe Environment Training (K of C Supreme Requirement)

The Safe Environment Program safeguards children and other vulnerable persons, assures members and their families that we maintain a safe environment, protects members from awkward situations, misunderstandings, and appearances of impropriety, builds trust with arch/dioceses and parishes, and protects the good name of the Knights of Columbus.

The training is mandated for: **Grand Knights, Program Directors, Community Directors, and Family Directors.** You can also help our council protect those at risk by registering for the training on a voluntary basis, even if not required by your position. Charmingly soft-spoken and yet powerfully incisive expressing his profound ideals, Fred Rogers was a unique presence on television for generations. Through interviews of his family and colleagues, the life of this would-be pastor is explored as a man who found a more important calling to provide an oasis for children in a video sea of violent bombardment. That proved to be his landmark series, Mister Rogers' Neighborhood (1968), a show that could gently delve into important subjects no other children's show would have dared for that time. In doing so, Rogers experienced a career where his sweet-tempered idealism charmed and influenced the world whether it be scores of children on TV or recalcitrant authorities in government. However, that beloved personality also hid Rogers' deep self-doubts about himself and occasional misjudgments even as he proved a rock of understanding in times of tragedy for a world that did not always comprehend a man of such noble character.


