GOSPEL

As soon as morning came, the chief priests with the elders and the scribes, that is, the whole Sanhedrin held a council. They bound Jesus, led him away, and handed him over to Pilate. Pilate questioned him, "Are you the king of the Jews?" He said to him in reply, "You say so." The chief priests accused him of many things. Again Pilate questioned him, "Have you no answer? See how many things they accuse you of." Jesus gave him no further answer, so that Pilate was amazed.

Now on the occasion of the feast he used to release to them one prisoner whom they requested. A man called Barabbas was then in prison along with the rebels who had committed murder in a rebellion. The crowd came forward and began to ask him to do for them as he was accustomed. Pilate answered, "Do you want me to release to you the king of the Jews?" For he knew that it was out of envy that the chief priests had handed him over. But the chief priests stirred up the crowd to have him release Barabbas for them instead. Pilate again said to them in reply, "Then what do you want me to do with the man you call the king of the Jews?" They shouted again, "Crucify him." Pilate said to them, "Why? What evil has he done?" They only shouted the louder, "Crucify him." So Pilate, wishing to satisfy the crowd, released Barabbas to them and, after he had Jesus scourged, handed him over to be crucified.

The soldiers led him away inside the palace, that is, the praetorium, and assembled the whole cohort. They clothed him in purple and, weaving a crown of thorns, placed it on him. They began to salute him with, "Hail, King of the Jews!" and kept striking his head with a reed and spitting upon him. They knelt before him in homage. And when they had mocked him, they stripped him of the purple cloak, dressed him in his own clothes, and led him out to crucify him.

They pressed into service a passer-by, Simon, a Cyrenian, who was coming in from the country, the father of Alexander and Rufus, to carry his cross.

They brought him to the place of Golgotha —which is translated Place of the Skull — They gave him wine drugged with myrrh, but he did not take it. Then they crucified him and divided his garments by casting lots for them to see what each should take. It was nine o'clock in the morning when they crucified him. The inscription of the charge against him read, "The King of the Jews." With him they crucified two revolutionaries, one on his right and one on his left. Those passing by reviled him, shaking their heads and saying, "Aha! You who would destroy the temple and rebuild it in three days, save yourself by coming down from the cross." Likewise the chief priests, with the scribes, mocked him among themselves and said, "He saved others; he cannot save himself. Let the Christ, the King of Israel, come down now from the cross that we may see and believe." Those who were crucified with him also kept abusing him.

At noon darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. And at three o'clock Jesus cried out in a loud voice, "*Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani*?" which is translated, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" Some of the bystanders who heard it said, "Look, he is calling Elijah." One of them ran, soaked a sponge with wine, put it on a reed and gave it to him to drink saying, "Wait, let us see if Elijah comes to take him down." Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last.

The veil of the sanctuary was torn in two from top to bottom. When the centurion who stood facing him saw how he breathed his last he said, "Truly this man was the Son of God!" For this weekend's readings, click here.

Palm Sunday / 2024 PALM AND CROSS

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

Palm Sunday is about the palm, of course. It is the day we remember Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, how the crowds received him, shouting Hosanna. But the crowds quickly changed — crowds can be like that. And by the end of the week, the Hosannas were long gone. In fact, so were the people, including Jesus' own friends. After the Last Supper, He was betrayed, denied, mocked and crucified.

We call Jesus' suffering and death on the cross his "passion." Today we read the Passion found in Mark's Gospel. Today is also about the Cross which is why today's official title is PALM SUNDAY OF THE LORD'S PASSION.

All during this season of Lent, the cross has stood tall in our sanctuary. On every Sunday of the year, at every Eucharist, we recall Christ's death, "until He comes again," as St. Paul tells us. We do the same during Holy Week, gathering with the Church around the world, celebrating Christ's passion and resurrection — the Paschal Mystery — in the liturgies of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday, the Great Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday morning.

This week tells us who Jesus Christ is ... and who we are. This week plunges us into Christ's body, into the mystery of God's presence and love for us. Again, I urge everyone to enter into as many of the liturgies as you can. Try not to fit in Holy Week around your other activities. Give Holy Week a priority. When we do this it makes a difference in our Easter and in our lives.

Our Holy Week and Easter Triduum schedule is in this bulletin and also can be found on our parish website. If you are reading this and have been away from Mass, this is the perfect time to return. Easter is all about a new beginning, new life. But first, we wave our palm and welcome Jesus into Jerusalem. We take up His cross and follow Him.

May it be a blessed, life-changing, love-deepening, very holy Holy Week.

THE WORD THAT GOES WITH "PASSION"

The Eucharistic Prayer is a very long prayer. Let's face it, it's difficult to be totally tuned in while the priest is praying it. Quite normal to have the mind drift in and out. Especially difficult to concentrate and stay focused when you're kneeling and your back aches and your knees hurt (because the kneeler pads have worn thin — maybe the pastor will have them reupholstered soon!).

So, there is one word that we might miss in the Second Eucharistic Prayer (used very often at our Masses), one word that goes with the word "passion."

"Willingly."

"At the time He was betrayed and entered **willingly** into His Passion, he took bread ..."

How could He do that? How could Jesus willingly suffer, submit to insult and torture and eventual crucifixion? It could only be a radical trust in the presence of God, as well as a radical belief that the goodness of God would prevail, that no evil, no matter how heinous, could defeat it.

When we partake in the Eucharist, we participate in the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Do we believe this sacramental communion with Christ can strengthen us to have that same radical trust and belief as Jesus so that we too can willingly take up His cross and follow Him, dying to self, joining in the suffering of others, accompanying those hurting, loving freely beyond measure? Do we believe this?

PALM SUNDAY'S Eucharistic Word: PASSION

Connecting the Gospel to the Eucharist: Mark 14:1-15:47

Holy Week begins on what is commonly known as Palm Sunday. The Catholic Church's official title for this day is PALM SUNDAY OF THE LORD'S PASSION. The Passion refers to the suffering and death of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. During this Mass, the narrative of the Lord's Passion is proclaimed. We hear of Christ's betrayal and interrogation; Peter's denial; Pilate's condemning Him; His crucifixion and burial.

Also included in the reading of the Passion is the Lord's Last Supper, when Jesus transformed the Passover meal "into the memorial of his voluntary offering to the Father for the salvation of [humanity]" (Catholic Catechism #610).

It is impossible to celebrate the Eucharist without recalling the Passion of Christ. As St. Paul himself wrote in the earliest written record of the institution of the Eucharist: "For as often as you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the death of the Lord, until He comes" (1 Corinthians 11:26). We repeat St. Paul's very words in one of our Memorial Acclamations that follows the consecration.

In the Catechism of the Catholic Church

Christ's death is both the Paschal sacrifice that accomplishes the definitive redemption of [humanity], through "the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world," and the sacrifice of the New Covenant, which restores [humanity] to communion with God by reconciling [humanity] to God through the "blood of the covenant, which was poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins." [#613]

> In the Eucharist, we adore Christ, we receive Christ, and we become Christ for others.

PASSION: From Late Latin *passionem* (nominative *passio*), meaning "suffering, enduring."

COMPASSION: From Late Latin *compassionem* (nominative *compassio*), from *com* "with, together" + *pati* "to suffer," to suffer with, together.

COMPASSION, CHRISTMAS AND THE EUCHARIST

Palm Sunday remembers Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem where we know danger & hostility awaited him. Jesus went to the cross where He gave His life for us. His death brings us the fullness of salvation, but certainly everywhere Jesus went prior to the cross, He brought His redemptive, healing love. If we are to take up His cross and follow Him, as He instructed us to do, we must go where Jesus walked and be with the people Jesus accompanied.

Jesus visited with, talked with and shared meals with friends and adversaries. He went to the bedside of the sick and dying. He laid hands on people deemed "untouchable" and "unclean" and let them touch him. He gave hope to the condemned. He stepped over borders and spoke with foreigners. He welcomed children. He comforted the grieving. He met with those who challenged authority. He prayed alone in the desert and with the faith community. He walked with anyone hurting and suffering. All of the above is completely consistent with the title given to Jesus at His birth: God WITH Us.

There is therefore an intimate connection between the birth of Christ and the passion of Christ. WITH. Jesus Christ is God WITH us in every aspect of human life, both in joy and suffering.

Compassion means "to suffer with." When we partake of the Eucharist, we partake of Christ's life and mission. The Eucharist strengthens us to be compassionate people, to be people who journey with the suffering, who accompany those who are in pain, lost, hurting.




MORNING PRAYER




